## pete speaks

In sitting down to write a message for Creaseline, I am struck by how difficult it is for once to write anything positive.

On the cricket front we have had serious differences in recent times with the CCA and particularly with the competition. Also there are the usual difficulties in collection of subscriptions and attendances in the Clubhouse Bar after games.

While subscriptions are coming in as well as last year, there are still those who are dragging the chain. The committee even decided at its last meeting that one team that had only 3 financial members would be withdrawn from the competition unless the situation was remedied within the next 7 days.

I met with this team and the general comment was "we've been a bit slack in relation to subs". I couldn't agree more, but this does not assist the club in meeting its financial commitments. I am pleased to say that this situation has been rapidly addressed, but it shouldn't have to come to this before action is taken.

There are still the same persistent offenders in the late payment stakes with only 2 weeks of competition left and the committee will need to be stronger next season. I will be promoting that a deposit on subscription of 50 % for all players before they play a game be instituted for next season.

Apart from the subscription issue, we are not achieving the level of assistance from Gaming Machine Trusts for uniforms and playing equipment that we have in the past or had hoped to have this year. This will mean that we will not meet our budgets for this year and will need to raise funds in other ways.

The committee has committed to the selling of chocolate bars as a means of achieving some much needed revenue and it is hoped that all teams will fully support this fundraising venture. The club stands to make around \$1,100 once all of the chocolate has been sold. We have until 30<sup>th</sup> March to pay for it and really need it all sold before then.

The Clubhouse Bar has become an embarrassment for the club in its relationship with The Woolston Club. I have been in the bar on two occasions recently where I was the only person to appear from our whole club. The comparison is made on a regular basis with the Soccer Section which regularly has over 100 people in the bar including wives and children.

The committee had instituted the idea of Club Day on the last Saturday of each month with the intention of having a good attendance on one Saturday in the month, at least, but the last two Club Days were totally non-events as very few people turned up. The Senior Men's team has been the only regular attendees at the Club Days.

I personally am fast losing interest in being involved with a club where the support is so lacking and interest in meeting up with clubmates and discussing the club's activities is almost non-existent. This sort of lack of interest makes me query whether I still want to be involved with the club. Hopefully there will be a good turnout for the final day of the season and I can meet with you all there.

In the meantime enjoy what is left of the season and please plan to attend the Clubhouse Bar on the last Saturday of the season.

## reido's report

Hi all,

With a massively challenging season both on and off the field almost over, for myself there is a huge sigh of relief, knowing that the 2008-09 season will soon be confined to history. On one front all season it seemed representatives of the club have continually battled the CCA on various issues. This has been disheartening, frustrating, massively time consuming and exhausting. For our executive that is amateur and gives so freely of our time for the love of the game, having continual points of referrals or differences with the CCA has been disappointing. I know this leaves one to question, why do I need to be in this position? For most of us this is not our **job**, we are voluntary. We are not paid to serve, we have to balance the many hours of cricket and its administration around other facets of our busy lives. This season for instance we have engaged our lawyer on two separate issues. I shake my head and wonder in what direction sport is going. This is the so called grassroots, what the heck is going on.

A number of factors mean it is harder to find people willing to join sports clubs whether as players and/or administrators. At the end of the day as an administrator it can be far less painful to bang your head against a brick wall than being placed in the position that a few on our executive found themselves in. At least after banging your head the picture is clearer.

It was disappointing not to have any of our morning grade teams in the one day finals on March 01, a scenario that thankfully is extremely rare. It was hugely unexpected and gut wrenching for those involved in the Premier Men's set up, we were astonished when our guys were dumped out of the playoffs, despite believing that on the field they had legitimately qualified. The CCA moved the goal-posts and pulled the rug right from under the team. I shake my head on this and only hope in the future that this scenario is not experienced by any other team, let alone a senior team. Although it's hard to fathom the logic of the CCA decision and move on, in essence we have to, hoping that situations like this don't occur again.

Whilst I don't believe in making rules for rules sake it must be made transparently clear before any competition commences what the actual rules of the grade are. Competition formats must be locked in place. That way it is fair, with everyone on the same level playing field, rather than playing right up to the playoffs and then have dumped on you a reverse of what had previously been confirmed. In any given season it will rain at various stages of the season, that's just hard luck. I have played long enough to lose competitions because of Mother Natures intervention, you feel crappy at the time but at the end of the day its one of those things that we have very little control over.



Our 2a team despite having an extremely good start in the one day competition fell off the pace quite badly. Unfortunately losing games can become a bad habit and can often be difficult to turn around.

Our 2c team had opportunities to close out games in their one day competition but didn't quite grasp them. As a consequence we found there was a fine line between success and failure, a lesson we unfortunately learnt on a few occasions.

Reading this so far you may think that I need to take a chill pill. I'm pleased to say that it is not all doom and gloom. The flicker of light that beckons will no doubt reinvigorate us all to remain positive and strive forward. After the completion of this season I look forward to 2009-10 believing that we are on the way forward and relationship issues with the CCA can surely only improve.

Our two 20/20 Competition winning teams, Premier Women who won the Show Weekend competition and 2a Men who won the Pre Xmas segment were in such hot form before Xmas. The men were so close to unbeatable, unfortunately they have been anything since. Although you can make several logical explanations on why the women have struggled it is very puzzling the sudden form loss of the men. While I don't doubt the desire of the team to win and despite having a number of young guys finding their way at this level it is important that we continue to build strength in the morning grade section, so that pressure can be applied to those that may be under achieving.

In my December report I touched on the amazing run scoring exploits of Stephen Mackenzie and Scott Wilson. I apologise to both these guys if it appears my reporting of their exploits has placed a hex on them and jinxed their achievements since. In Stephen's defence he is playing higher as a result of his accomplishments. I'm sure once Stephen adjusts to fatherhood he will again be scoring heavily. Despite a low return since it always pays to remember the old cliché that form is temporary, class is permanent. Cricket is such a great leveller.

I also highlighted in December's report the fact that we hadn't lost a day to the weather. Well that's another topic in future I will stay away from. Since then we have lost three playing days with the first rained out day aided later on in the season by the CCA, ultimately sinking the Premier Men's teams one day aspirations.

At this stage of the season realistically the only team capable of further championship honours is the Pohutukawa team of 3a who currently lie first equal. Hopefully their form holds and at the seasons end they are able to celebrate a job well done.

During the course of a season many players question the level of their subscription. While I believe our subs easily compare with other CCA Clubs myself and others on the executive are often asked "Why am I paying this amount?" "Where does my sub go?" This information is posted to members in August each year (as well as being available on the website). It is found in the Financial Performance section of the Annual Report book. This is also discussed at the August AGM of which everyone is welcome and encouraged to attend.

Thanks to all who supported last months quiz fundraiser. An extremely enjoyable night was hosted by Bert Walker. Despite a good turnout it was disappointing the noticeable absence of teams or representatives from the Men's 2a, 3a Pohutukawas and 3c Baboons. Come on guys, please get behind these initiatives and show your club support.

The club is looking at other fundraising options and one we are currently selling is the popular Cadbury chocolate bars. Most of us love chocolate so we believe that these will be extremely easy to sell. As a club it is important that we support these ventures. With the decline in trust application funding and sponsorships it is vital that we are proactive in the way we go about increasing revenue. We believe selling the chocolates is an easy way to make money so thanks to all who have supported this.

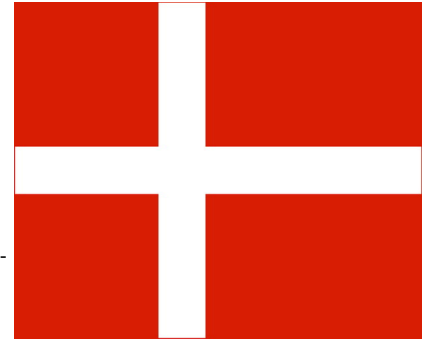
# prem report

## PREMIER MEN - Denied by the Danes?

The premier men's squad was baffled when, having qualified for the one-day semi-finals under the criteria given us by Canterbury Cricket, they were subsequently omitted from the playoffs when the qualifying rules were changed AFTER the round-robin had ended.

Peter Crowhen, our normally jovial club president, clarified it for one and all when he told The Press that "Something is rotten in the state of Denmark". Peter was borrowing a line from the character Marcellus in Hamlet, a play by William Shakespeare, who was an Englishman even more famous than W G Grace.

Alerted by Peter to the fact that we were actually playing in a Danish cricket competition, the premiers sent the team manager off to study some more of Hamlet. He discovered that Hamlet himself had referred to Denmark as "an unweeded garden" (probably a reference to the wicket that we are currently playing on at Burnside) of "things rank and gross in nature" (obviously Hamlet was no fan of those running his competition either).



Reinforced by the stunning news we were dicing with the Danes, other rulings from the Canterbury Cricket bunker suddenly became clear.

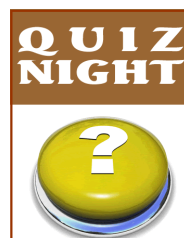
## quiz night

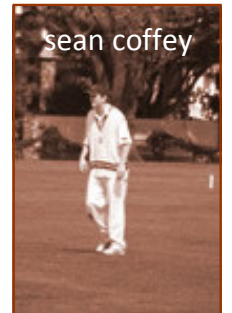
