I was checking morning emails that arrive over night from NZ here in Holland when I had one from Lukey sitting in my inbox. Nothing unusual about that, we keep in constant contact about club stuff and to keep up where each of us may be at any point in time.

Lukey had no other way to say it except how it was. ‘Possum had passed away’. The feeling of shock and numbing disbelief that I experienced will undoubtedly have been felt by all of us who received this news. There must be some mistake. I read it again, hoping it was one of Trev’s many practical jokes that he is inclined to play on us all, but I knew that this was no joke, a club legend, a lovely bloke and a great friend to so many, was no longer with us, taken far too early and in my case, thousands of miles away.

Not that I could have done anything about it but for some reason I feel guilty for not being around him, was there something I could have done if I had been there. I know all of us will be asking similar questions of ourselves.

The problem when someone like Possum is taken away from us is that we feel a great sadness. This sadness has nothing to do with Possum really, he will be ok, a good man like him has no fears in the afterlife (if there is one) and he is resting and contented, it is a sadness for ourselves that we are now feeling. Humans are basically selfish and when someone or something is taken from us we will react, usually with anger or sadness.

No more can we enjoy the warm feeling of friendship that he offered every time he waddled into our ground or clubrooms, no more can we laugh at his quirky sense of humor, no more can we listen to his passionate cricket theories over a beer on a hot norwest night at Garrick Park, no more will he coach and encourage players from all ages and skill levels at the club, no more will I enjoy the chatter of a lovely, caring friend as we walk around the many Canterbury golf courses we used to play at.



The sadness is, is that my life is now poorer for his passing, and yes Possum, I am angry and sad that you have done this to me, it is the only uncaring thing that I can ever remember you doing.

One final memory of Possum which I will never forget- on one of my ventures back over to NZ after we had returned to the UK Possum asked if I fancied a bit of white baiting on one of Macca’s rivers! A day of bliss and tranquility was not to be passed up with our Possum and so off we set in the famous ‘orange mini’. We sat down to catch what can only be described as a pathetic pittance of some very sad looking whitebait.

Packing up all the gear and there was a lot of it we returned to the orange mini’ Poss asked if I would drive and so on putting the key in the ignition turned it to the deathly sound of click click. “Possum I think the starting motor is shot” To which Possum replied “It can’t be it’s never done that before!!!”

That to me summed up Possum beautifully- “Delightfully naive at times!!”

Gutted mate.....Absolutely shattered and disbelieving when I heard the news of your passing. Tuesday August 10th at work was a write off once news filtered through. I needed to know what the hell was going on. Searching for confirmation it hit me and countless others extremely hard, striking like a bolt out of the blue. It has been all I could think about since. You were taken from us unexpectedly and consequently far too early.

Cricket as we all know was a massive part of your life with LPCC/LPW your second family, it is not an understatement that in my view you were a legend and I don't use that term lightly. Possum on occasions you were a stubborn bugger.....once your mind was set you would not budge and would stick to your principles whatever the consequences. Your passing has left a massive gap; you have been truly a loyal friend, one of the best and a valued clubman for many years.

Possum, we have been mates a long time, going back approximately 24 years when I came back to Lancaster Park Cricket as a fresh faced kid from High School. You always took an interest in the new "younger" players and always provided a positive word here or there whether at training or at the bar on a Saturday night; that made us feel very welcome and accepted. I have always valued the friendship, comradeship, your words of wisdom and advice that you have always been willing to freely pass on.

Your confidence and encouragement to me as a player and as a person has always been taken on board, dissected and appreciated. Even as I have advanced myself in years I have realised to stay competitive on the field that I must improve further and training smarter is one way. I certainly don't have all the answers, there has been no one better for me to seek advice or use as a sounding board than you.

The "old" days back in the LPCC clubrooms on Stevens Street were magical, in the late 1980's and through the early to mid 1990's "drink drive" was not so visible and the club was open and vibrant late into the night. Possum would be in his element, peanuts in one hand and pint of beer close at hand where he generally held centre stage retelling numerous stories of his cricketing experiences.

You never tired of hearing the stories, no matter how many times you heard



them over the years. After being amongst the last to leave you and your good mate Rod Cameron would venture over to the Lancaster Hotel for a few more quiet beers.

Always a club man, always have been Possum. You have always shown a great love for the game whether playing, coaching, running your eye over players, umpiring, team manager or coming back to the club after the days play. The last couple of years you have managed the 2nd grade team alongside captain Ben Cameron.

I know you were excited by the potential of any leg spin bowler but you were mightily impressed by the abilities of Nick McGuire and Nick Kyle, those boys could turn the ball a mile.

I know Ben and the boys greatly valued your presence and contribution, our job now is to ensure the team that had a special place in your heart over the last few years does not falter, yet continues to prosper.

After the sun had started to set on Possums career and as he was looking to ease back a little, bear in mind he was around forty years of age, as captain of the 3rd grade side in the 1996-97 season I was fortunate to have him playing alongside me.

I always appreciated and valued what Possum brought to a team and wanting to have a competitive team that would push for competition honours Possum was top of the list to mould the team around, along with his old sparring partner Brian "Rangi" Butler. Knowing the balancing act and diplomacy skills required on my part with having both in the same team I can only comment that Possum was the complete professional and along with Bruce Cameron who had just joined the club they made a formidable trio.

Possum your abilities and class was there for all to see, you could play all the shots with effortless ease but what impressed me was a refusal when batting to sell yourself short, you always had a high price on your wicket.

The winning of the 3rd grade competition, unbeaten with maximum points was a real credit and highlight for all involved, but your experience, presence and the mana you had within the team and from the opposition was richly deserved and ensured we never lost focus.

I have been fortunate to have been alongside you on a number of occasions since, being a total club man your refusal to allow teams to play short has this last season for instance seen you take the field for both the 2nd and 3rd grade teams.

Filling in for 3rd grade verse Sydenham last December where you came on with one wicket to get and totally bamboozled the opening batsmen who had long been set, dismissed for 89, caught and bowled after he had hit you for 6 the ball



before. You always had the last say. No one was happier than me to see you take that final wicket, the old master at work one final time. I believe that was your final wicket for the club.

I recall watching you bat in what was probably one of your last opportunities as a recognised top order batsman for Presidents on the last day of the 2006-07 season, where St Albans needed to win to clinch the competition. You opened the batting chasing not too large a total where Saints threw everything at you but like a rock you didn't flinch and scored a fine fifty resulting in a good victory for the team.

The innings was one of real class with a number of your trademark shots on display highlighting that despite your serious accident only a few years back that "class is permanent" and you could still easily foot it with the best in the grade.

I will always treasure the fact that you came to my home in July with your cricket report for me to type for our Annual Report. You mentioned you were only going to stay a couple of minutes but ended up staying close to 2 hours, it would have been longer but I had to leave for winter sports. That time we shared along with my wife Ronalda and children we will never forget.

Your passing has hit me hard, I have firstly lost a close mate and secondly with you being a loyal club member that was always prepared to help in so many different areas. When the summer seasons roll around, not having you there Possum will leave a massive void, one that will never be filled. I know myself a part of me has gone, the club and teams will continue on but we will certainly be the poorer.

I was privileged on Friday August 13th to be at the funeral which was a private family ceremony along with a handful of club members, for that I am deeply honoured.

I will miss you greatly my friend, yet I know come each October you will be looking down on us all as we take to the field.

President's Report



The 2009/10 cricket season was a very successful season for the club, winning two grades, Men's 2B and Presidents and with consistency across all grades taking the Peterson Shield for the most successful club for the season.

The Peterson Shield winner is calculated by taking the results of all teams in each club over the season and allocating points based on finishing positions in their grades and then taking an average of them. The club with the highest average wins the shield.

While winning the shield is a great result for the club, it should be borne in mind that lower the number of teams a club has in the competitions, the easier it is to achieve a higher average. This highlights a trend that has been occurring in the club over the past few years; that is that the club is reducing in size and has fewer teams now than ever before.

This season we had 8 teams; 5 men's, 1 women's and 2 youth teams in CCA competitions. In addition we had a joint junior women's team with Sydenham. This compares with the club's playing strength when we first amalgamated with Woolston of 9 men's and 2 women's teams.

The Junior section had 11 teams and this compares with 19 at amalgamation.

This is a trend that must be addressed to ensure the future viability of the club. Recruitment is a very necessary focus for the club over the next two months.

The season also saw the reorganisation of the administration of the club and the return of the finances to the separate entity of Lancaster Park Cricket Club Inc. This move combined the playing and investment arms of the club, but made for a different focus with a clearly defined cricket committee. This committee was very well led by Trevor Luke, ably assisted by Club Captain, Aaron Reid.

A number of major changes occurred in the operations this year, due to Trevor's leadership and these included a successful return to the All Sports Pavilion as a venue for after match functions. Numbers coming back after games improved greatly and raffles which were administered by Ric Horsfall and Ivan Lawson provided much needed funds for continuing operations.

The move back to the committee being rostered onto the bar was also very successful and the atmosphere in the clubrooms was much better than the previous two years. This allowed us to make a profit on the bar, rather than the situation in the past where we had paid barpersons and the bar cost the club money to run.

Unfortunately some teams have not supported the clubrooms as much as we would like and it remains for us to convince them that it is the place to be on a Saturday night after cricket.

Ric Horsfall's hosting of the Prizegiving was a masterly effort and the support in terms of players and partners was outstanding. This has become quite the social occasion of the year, as it should be. Once again the format of a meal with the presentation interspersed was very successful and Ric, not to miss an opportunity arranged raffles which helped to defray costs.

On the social side, I believe that this season was the best in some years, with a well supported Bus Trip and a very successful quiz night, once again hosted by the one and only Bert Walker in which a great night was had by all. A large number of sponsors came to the party for this event which was greatly appreciated and this event also raised a significant amount of funds for the club.

Fundraising is a continuing issue for all clubs, with the gaming machine dollar becoming harder and harder to obtain and Ric Horsfall's efforts in the fundraising area over the past year have been very successful. He has further ideas in train for the 2010/11 season and has initiated a number of them already.

I hope you will all winter well and come back refreshed and keen for the new season. I look forward to meeting up with you all again at the Open Day and Annual General Meeting prior to the start of the new season.

From our women's team Emma Campbell and Lucy Foote also represented Otago. Maria Fahey and Emma Campbell also represented the NZ White Ferns during the season and are to be congratulated for that.

Progress on the field relates to improved performance and development we look to achieve this with a comprehensive coaching programme ably lead by Garry MacDonald, Garry's experience and expertise are invaluable at our club and the performances on and off the field by the men's premier side were a positive reflection on both Garry and the players .

Our development coaching is centered very much around our youth teams and our school programmes and these are paying dividends with the success of the U17 Youth. Once again Garry is to the forefront of this with Charlie Tibbotts, Paul Bennett and Mark Oates.

It is our intention in the coming season to develop this youth and junior coaching even more to give a greater penetration into schools in our area and in this way continue the rejuvenation in all sections of the club.

The junior section of the club is showing signs of progress again and thanks for the organisation of this must go to Charlie and Karen Tibbotts for the work they have put in and we look forward to the juniors once again being an integral part of the club and not at arms length.

Off the field we have made significant changes to the way the club is run and we still continue to change and refine these as the new season progresses. Our committee is slightly smaller than in previous years but now all are contributing to running the club and running it well.

I would like to thank all of the committee for their work this year and at times I am sure they dreaded phone messages or email from me requesting them to do another job.

In a situation where everyone made a meaningful contribution it is a little unfair to single anyone out but the work Aaron Reid puts in each week in and out of season is one of the main reasons our club continues to function relatively smoothly.

Changes which are easily noticeably are the return to the All Sports Pavilion for our after match festivities and the success of social events such as the quiz and the prize giving. We expect the ASP to become even more of an event centre next season and welcome all members and ex members to come along and contribute to the enjoyment.

Less noticeable changes are occurring in the way we fund our club and to reduce any reliance on gaming machine funding which is becoming more and more difficult to obtain so please if you are asked to contribute to fundraising please do it as it is the life blood of the club. We are looking at changes to investment of club funds and these will be related at the AGM.

It has at times been a difficult year financially but with our long term legacy and planning from previous years we have got through it with a reasonable result and will look to improve on that this year.

We won due to the consistently high placings across the grades by most of our teams, capped by competition wins by the 2B, Presidents and the Youth Girls Twenty/20 teams. To give you an idea of our accomplishment and how difficult it is to win the Petersen Shield we were also victorious in 2002-03 and previous to that way back in 1973-74 as the Lancaster Park Cricket Club.

Congratulations to Nathan Jones and Ric Horsfall in captaining Presidents to their competition win. The grade has always has been very competitive and until now championship wins had proved elusive, with a number of near misses over the last twelve seasons. With a handy points lead going into the last month the team made things interesting by only wrapping up the grade win on the last day of the season. It certainly was a fitting conclusion to the season with many club members joining the President and 2B teams in celebrations afterwards at the All Sports Club, reinforcing to all what our club spirit and harmony is all about.

Congratulations to 2B on winning their two-day competition on the very last ball of the season. The start to the season saw a number of changes to the team and they richly deserved the accolades that came their way. The team had a good season finishing runner-up in the Twenty/20 and making the semi finals of the one-day competition.

Our Youth Girls team, a combined team with Sydenham played well to win the Twenty/20 trophy whilst Paul Bennett's under 17's team backed by a number of good performances did well to easily win their competition. Congratulations to both teams.

At the Woolston Club Sports Awards on Monday 19th October 2009 our Premier Men's Team won the 'Sports Team of the Year Award'. The team won the 2009



National Club One-Day Championships with an unbeaten run in Auckland and faced stiff competition from the Football Section, Woolston Tech AFC coached by former All White Keith Braithwaite.

We welcomed from Namibia our professional Gerrie Snyman. I'm sure Gerrie would be disappointed with his input, struggling with back problems and illness he only briefly showed glimpses of his abilities, however his professionalism and easy fit within the team was valued.

James Brown from England stepped straight into the Premier team as wicket-keeper. Although James would be disappointed with his batting he made huge positive strides in the coaching of our youth and school children. Later in the season Scott Duggan came onboard and James became a valued member of the 2A team. Many thanks to Paul Bennett and family for housing James.

The CCA one-day finals were held in February. For the second season running none of our morning grade teams were involved. Our best performed team was 2B, beaten in the semi-finals by Burnside who went on to repeat their competition win from the previous season. I'm hopeful next season will feature our teams at the business end of this competition.

Maria Fahey and Emma Campbell represented the White Ferns with Maria being in the May squad that finished runner-up at the Twenty/20 World Cup in the West Indies. In June-July Maria toured England with the White Ferns.

Maria Fahey and Frances Mackay played for Canterbury while Emma Campbell and Lucy Foote represented Otago.

Until injury sidelined his representative play Andrew Ellis played for Canterbury while Ryan McCone was involved in the four day competition.

We were fortunate to have Andrew in our Premier line-up at every opportunity and Andrew's commitment and enthusiasm to play is hugely commended.

Congratulations to the winners from our club prize giving night held on April 25th. The night was a huge success with approximately 125 people in attendance.

All club awards are an acknowledgement of achievement and are listed

elsewhere in this publication however I would like to highlight some significant achievements.

Marty Kain (Premier Men) 051209 vs. Sydenham at Sydenham Park. In the first innings Marty recorded figures of 7-48. Marty's second innings figures of 4-46 gave him a match haul of 11-94.

Andrew Ellis & Keryn Ambler (Premier Men) 270310 vs. Riccarton at Garrick 1. On the last day of the season after Riccarton totally dominated the first day LPW batted throughout the second day to ensure our closest challenges for the Petersen Shield Riccarton, would not leapfrog LPW. Batting superbly Andrew scored 149 and in partnership with captain Keryn Ambler scoring 116 no added 248 runs in 243 minutes off a mammoth 404 balls. Stumps were pulled early at 283/1.

Adam Hastilow (2A) 051209 vs. Sydenham at Garrick 1. The pressure was on at 3 wickets down for 5 runs when Adam strode to the crease. Deemed one of the best innings at any level by team manager and club legend Ross Calder, Adam scored 138 to enable the team to declare at 264/6.

Dayne Gardner (2B) 060210 vs. Burnside at Garrick 2. In the first innings of a two-day match Dayne's figures were 20.1-6-61-8 with seven of the dismissals either bowled or LBW. Dayne's achievement saw the team take first innings points and significantly contributed to the team winning outright on the last ball of the match.

Mitchell Tabb (2B) 090110 vs. Burnside at Ilam 1. In a Twenty/20 match Burnside batting first was scoring quickly and without fuss. Mitchell came into the attack after 10 overs at 93 for 1 and after completing four straight overs recorded figures of 4-0-18-6. I believe these figures to be the best recorded by a LPW player in the Twenty/20 format. Featuring 3 caught and bowled Mitchell was superb as Burnside was dismissed for 148.

Jeremy Styles (Presidents) Thrown in at the start of the season to open, akin to a sacrificial lamb, Jeremy made the position his own and never looked back. Scoring seven fifty's with a high score of 87 Jeremy was remarkably consistent and ended with 626 runs at an average of 41.73. A fantastic achievement for one of the unheralded members of the team.

Achieved on the last day of the season Andrew Ellis (Premier men) scored the highest club score of 149 and along with Keryn Ambler (Premier men) and Samantha Fitzsimon (Premier women) they all recorded two hundreds. It is worth noting of the ten hundreds recorded four each were scored by the Premier Men and Premier Women.

Dayne Gardner recorded the best bowling figures of 8-61 and of the sixteen instances of five wicket bags being recorded six were accomplished by 2B



players. Dayne, Mitchell Tabb of 2B and Troy Scanlon of Premier Men appear on the list twice.

It made sense to relocate from the Woolston Club prior to the start of the season back to the All Sports Club. In regards to socialising, having a beer and being able to watch cricket this greatly increased the numbers coming back after games.

An area that had been poor for many years has been socialising, our efforts this season as a consequence of a lot of hard work from the social committee was greatly improved. It was pleasing to have a number of events (these are covered under the Social Report) over the season. Well done to the Premier Men who wholly supported all club activities and easily outshone all other teams in this regard. It's now up to the rest of the teams to see if they can match the support shown by the Premier lads.

A captain faces many challenges. 2A's Ben Cameron in his second year as captain deserves a special mention. He has the hardest captaincy job in the club. His team is the most heavily affected from week to week through changing personnel, with players going up or down between teams, or unavailable for a multiple of reasons. Ben does well to assimilate the constant changes and displays a real passion with a strong desire for the team to perform at a high level. Although his work commitments affected his availability for trainings Ben has a hunger that will in the very foreseeable future see this team seriously challenge again for a grade win.

We are fortunate over the years to have had a number of outstanding administrators prepared to give so freely of their time. It was no coincidence that the club managed to gain some positive momentum, it felt good to actually believe as a club we were able to be proactive on a number of fronts rather than through necessity reactive. President Peter Crowhen had done a superb job over the last nine seasons, however at the season's start we were fortunate to have Trevor Luke come on board in a newly created role as Chairman, allowing Peter to effectively move into the background. Trevor operated very hands on, ensuring that all on the committee are performing, focused and looking after our areas of responsibilities. Trevor certainly does nothing by half and in such a short time has managed to review and shake up all areas of the club.

Backed by a strong leadership our administration team helped to put all the bricks in place to create a strong forward moving club, the evidence we have partly seen this season based on our on field results. Even though our team numbers at the start of the season on the adult side have been at the lowest level ever it made us take stock and examine all of our activities from the ground up, from the juniors to the seniors. It's not easy based where we are in regards to a catchment area for players.



However with the right structures in place we can certainly project ourselves in a proactive and positive way around the schools in the community. Also with members through word of mouth which is a powerful tool we are in a good position to boost numbers at all levels.

Club Coach Garry Macdonald's contribution is always valued. Respected by the players Garry again did a great job where his coaching, support and mentoring were appreciated. Having a number of new players gave Garry the opportunity to pass his knowledge onto a new generation. Thanks for your assistance Macca.

I would like to thank the captains, scorers and managers. You guys do a great job and certainly add tremendous value by making the player's jobs so much easier.

To Richard Derham thanks for all your assistance. Richard's contribution both on and off the field where he has performed without question any numbers of tasks that I have requested has been invaluable.

To my wife Ronalda and family a massive thanks for allowing me to fulfil this role, where unbelievably the commitment seems to grow bigger each season. Throw into that my playing and training commitments and again I owe them big time and with three young children rightly demanding more time from their father I believe I have almost run my course after seven years in this management role.

I feel extremely positive about the future of Lancaster Park Woolston CC. We are heading in the right direction both on and off the field. We have a number of hard working administrators and officials, we have junior, youth and senior teams, (males and females) that cater for all levels of ability, as well as serious and social teams. It is an exciting time in the morning grades, post Christmas a number of new members came onboard with a freshness and enthusiasm to get involved on the field and make a difference. As long as we retain and build each season with new and existing members we are in for a bright and positive future.

We have players amongst our midst that play provincial and international cricket, a coach that is second to none and the last few years has seen a golden period in our short history. We have two of the best match pitches in club cricket and have players and members that are loyal and proud to be associated with our club. We have all the ingredients to ensure that Lancaster Park Woolston CC continues to prosper and progress, ensuring that we remain not only locally but nationally one of the most prominent clubs around.

I feel extremely proud to be associated with our club and look forward with confidence to the 2010-11 season.

The relationship with Sydenham continued and this gave us a larger base of players to select from. It also provided us with a good number of youth players and a real pathway for girls of both clubs to play in meaningful competitions, with the ultimate goal being a clear and achievable pathway to playing for the Premier team. This relationship is crucial to the continued effort of recruiting and developing younger players who will then progress through and represent the Premier Women in the years ahead.

I for one look forward positively to the 2010-11 season and feel confident that we will continue progressing, moving forward in not only the women's section but the club as a whole.

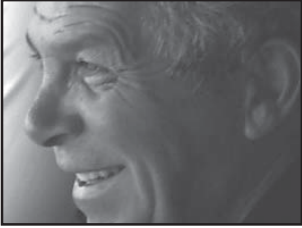

However one person's efforts can spark off a moment, or deliver a performance of sheer brilliance. That can inspire a team and either set a game in your favour, or it may dramatically alter the direction of a game.

I have highlighted the performances of three players, Dayne Gardner and Mitchell Tabb from our 2B team and Adam Hastilow from 2A. I'm sure you will agree after reading of their performances that they are truly deserving of having their achievements documented. After all performances of those documented and of this magnitude are extremely rare.

Dayne Gardner

Waitangi Day, February 06 2010, 2B's Dayne Gardner achieved his career best bowling figures, playing on Garrick 2 against the formidable Burnside team.

Dayne's performance of 20.1-6-61-8 was achieved in the first innings of a two-day match, a feat he accomplished almost single handed. The first wicket was caught by the wicket keeper, after that followed a trial of destruction. Testament to Dayne's accuracy he was rewarded with five bowled and two lbw's.

Burnside has been a champion team. Over the last two seasons they have been the team to beat in all forms of the game. We had not beaten Burnside for at least a couple of seasons and were coming off two weeks previously a heavy one-day semi final loss to them.

It was starting to become a psychological issue, as a team we knew we were good enough, but no matter how well we played we couldn't get over the line with one discipline, generally our batting letting us down badly. The layout and great batting deck of Garrick Park would suit our opponents perfectly. Burnside scored a respectable 230 all out, aided by a fine 94 to their captain, with 37 and 27 the only other scores of substance.

Dayne bowled his overs in two spells, his first opening the attack produced figures of 9-4-17-2 and his final spell straight after lunch when we were searching desperately for wickets. Burnside resumed after lunch at 127/2 and were poised to push on and set a large first innings total. In a display of stamina, showing great determination with an ability to keep to the task in hand, Dayne ran in hard, hit the right line and length and bowled accurately.



First over after lunch Dayne was sitting on a hat trick with the scoreboard now 131/4. Dayne throttled the life from the Burnside batsmen and in his 15th over was again sitting on a hat trick. Dayne's second spell produced figures of 11.1-2-44-6.

Dayne's bowling figures were the seventh best recorded in our twelve year amalgamation. Wayne Derham the bowler with the all time club best figures of 9-84 was ironically also achieved in this grade on the same ground back in the 2004-05 season.

Dayne was also in the team on that day and took the final wicket in the last over of the match after Wayne had been spelled, which ensured we won the championship. Fast forward to this game with Shane Keenan picking up the ninth wicket Wayne breathed a sigh of relief knowing that Dayne couldn't better his achievement. Those two have a great rivalry going back many years and it was fitting on both occasions they were on the field together.

Dayne's performance in the first innings set us up nicely and was the catalyst for not only the first innings points but to push on and win outright. Personal achievements are fantastic, yet if they contribute significantly to the teams objective of winning it just enriches the experience even more. We won on the very last ball, so you can imagine the jubilation and celebrations.

A lion hearted performance from a loyal club man. Dayne's performance was one of the best. Some days bowlers can bowl poorly yet have the rub of the green and pick up a decent wicket haul. Other days they may bowl superbly yet have nothing or very little to show for their endeavours.

On this day Dayne was truly rewarded for his contribution, leading ultimately to the biggest achievement of all, a superb team victory a month later that saw 2B win the biggest prize of all, again on the last ball of the match, the Two-Day Competition.

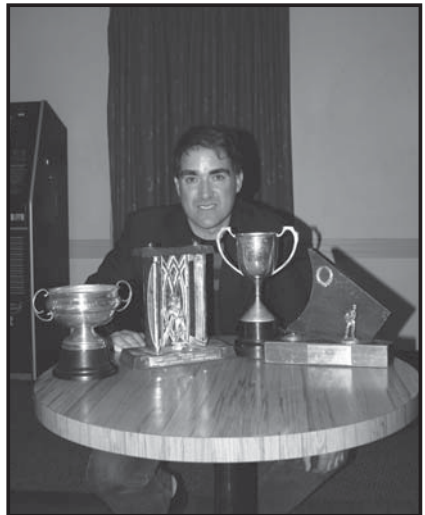

WHAT MIGHT HAVE BEEN...

The post-season huddle in the Lancaster Park-Woolston premier men's dressing room was in general agreement that 2009-10 had been a summer of frustration, of falling short of our aspirations, but one which contained enough promise to expect better outcomes in the near future.

After the euphoria of winning the national 50-overs club championship at Auckland the previous April, the frustration partly stemmed from just failing to make the one-day semi-finals and giving ourselves a chance to claim another Canterbury title so that we could defend the trophy up north.

Consecutive outright wins over eventual champion St Albans and third-placed East-Shirley, first innings successes against Marist-Harewood and Burnside-West, and a 248-run last-day partnership between Andrew Ellis (149) and Keryn Ambler (116 not out) proved that LPW should have finished higher in the two-day competition.

On top of all that, we reached the final of the Show Weekend Twenty/20 tournament for the second time in three years, only to be beaten by Riccarton in the final over of a low-scoring encounter.

Unfortunately, low scoring was too often the theme of the LPW campaign, whatever form of the game we were playing.

A failure to muster more than 132 runs, when only 145 were needed, against Country on Garrick Park No.2 midway through the one-dayers was always likely to haunt our overall fortunes. And so it proved as LPW stayed in contention for the playoffs until Chris Harris dominated our last-round game against St Albans.

Ambler was the exception in the limited-overs fixtures, his outstanding unbeaten century against Old Boys-Collegians tipping his average for that competition over 50.

His 359-run aggregate was 141 more than the next best, and no-one else could emulate his consistency.

Namibian professional all-rounder Gerrie Snyman entertained us with six sixes off Riccarton spinner Stu Liptrot on Hagley No.4, Andrew Duncan fell just short of a century in the season opener against Sydenham, and both Ellis and BJ Barnett



recorded one-day half-centuries. But they were all one-off efforts.

Ellis completely dominated the two-day batting, his 487 runs topping the next best aggregate by more than 200 and his 60.88 average more than double any other. He scored a century against Burnside-West during a purple patch of form, and finished off with that authoritative 149 at Riccarton's expense.

Apart from Ellis and Ambler, only Shaun Coffey, with a thumping 80 in the run-chase to set up a declaration against St Albans, registered a half-century. The aggressive Snyman could not get going in the two-dayers.

The most memorable bowling display was that of Ryan McCone and Marty Kain in the thrilling defeat of East-Shirley at Burwood Park. McCone mustered intimidating pace and Kain was at his most beguiling as the home side collapsed at their feet. Kain claimed seven wickets in an innings and 11 (for 94) in the match against Sydenham; his season's tally of 30 wickets was double the next highest.

We still need to find the formula for making early breakthroughs in two-day cricket. It did not help that Snyman's back problems restricted him to one spell per innings.

Medium-pacer Troy Scanlon came into his own in the one-dayers. The Buller Bullet began with a five-wicket haul against Sydenham and went on to capture 15 cheap wickets. Curiously, six of his eight two-day wickets were reaped in one innings.

There were plenty of associated highlights – the sacrifices in time and petrol made by Scanlon and Andrew Duncan in travelling from Westport; the outstanding example that Ellis continues to give the younger players; the wholehearted manner in which an initially reluctant Ambler embraced the captaincy; and the humour injected by Marty Kain and Jimmy Winstanley which contributed to a happy squad.

Coach Garry MacDonald left no stone unturned to make this a successful summer. But his task was made immensely more difficult by the necessity to change his team from week to week. To misquote Winston Churchill, never in the history of club cricket have so few players had so many weddings to attend in such a short time.

We missed Duncan and Scanlon as they spearheaded Buller's brave bid to qualify for a Hawke Cup challenge (not to mention late-season signing Ben Cant's sharing in North Otago's first-ever cup triumph), and there were more than enough injuries.

We thoroughly enjoyed having Gerrie Snyman and young English wicket-keeper James Brown with us. With an eye to the future, we also admired the ease with which talented teenager Scotty Duggan adjusted to the demanding task of keeping wickets at senior level.

Simon Gallop won the 2A attitude of the year award for his tireless work ethic and gutsy efforts on the park. He showed glimpses of his talent and promises to be a great club man for a number of years to follow. The club will watch his progress with great anticipation.

Player of the Year

Dan O'Reilly won the 2A player of the year award for the 2009/10 season. There was only one choice for the award this year as Dan put up some impressive numbers in all formats. His 2 Day statistics make exceptional reading. 136 over's for 369 runs at an average of 10.25, he took 4 wickets or more in an innings 4 times with best bowling of 6 for 35.

He delivered with the bat as well averaging 24.88 with two 50's. Dan lead the attack superbly showing at times a relentless desire to keep bowling and was an example to the younger guys of what is required to be successful at senior level.

Due to the fact we were rebuilding and needing to fill numerous gaps within the team my hopes at the start of the season were for us to be competitive and provide an environment everyone would find enjoyable. I wanted the players to have the opportunity to showcase their abilities thereby ensuring if we all bonded and knew our roles within the team structure we could all add value.

What I dearly wanted to see and it became evident throughout the season individually and consequentially as a team, we never gave up, resulting in us fighting and scrapping every inch of the way. It was vital the experienced players in Aaron Reid, Dayne Gardner, Wayne Derham and Stephen McKenzie lead from the front both on and off the field, thereby giving the team a self belief and a platform to perform from.

We were fortunate pre season and post Christmas a number of youthful new faces came to LPW. It was exciting seeing these guys come onboard to help

Dave took it hard being dropped after the first day of a two-day match but his strength of character saw him come back stronger and led to him contributing personally and on a team level. A solid batting display on the first day left us poised for first innings points the following Saturday.

Despite a couple of nervous flutters we were able to declare immediately once we passed the total. A crucial decision during the week was made to replace the out of form Dave McKenzie with new boy Mitch Rodden. It paid dividends in a way that no one could imagine possible at the start of the day.

Bowling well in the second innings we needed 215 to win from a maximum 42 overs. In his debut innings for the team opener Mitch Rodden used his feet superbly, scoring 102 off 111 balls. Mitchell Tabb came to the crease with the run rate soaring and with a whirlwind 38 of 18 balls was instrumental along with Mitch Rodden who was increasing his tempo in getting the chase back on target. Chris took the first four wickets with East's only 5 runs on the board.

With superb verbal encouragement from ball one East's were gone and despite losing their 5th wicket at 63 the game was ours to lose. Over many seasons the quirks of the draw has seen LPW in the last round having a decisive influence in determining the grade winners. This was our "final" and this time the solution was simple, knock over the top team Riccarton where we must gather both first innings points and an outright result to win the competition. Anything less and we would fall short and finish second.

Playing on the same track where we failed miserably a year before against St Albans in a competition deciding game we wanted to bat first. Having runs on the board I reasoned would take the pressure off us.

We lost the toss and batted anyway. With a number of starts Josh Bates was the only one who pushed on leading the way with a masterful 72, his maiden 50 for the club. We scored 234/9 declared, a total we were more than happy with, putting a lot of pressure on Riccarton to respond.

With the boys fired up and needing to strike early to rock Riccarton's confidence we surprisingly encountered little resistance and rolled them for a paltry 85 off only 28 overs. After a team discussion we decided not to enforce the follow on reasoning that Riccarton a second time around could not bat as poorly again, we wanted to continue dictating terms. With a lead of 149 we had 11 overs left until stumps but unfortunately lost more wickets than we were hoping finishing 27/3. It was a great first day where we were firmly in the box seat but realising we needed a total team effort on the second day to achieve our prized objective.

The lead up to day two proved extremely intense. During the week it was a real roller coaster. Mitchell Tabb who I believed would have had a massive influence on the second day both with the bat and more importantly as a match winning spin bowler pulled out to spend the weekend travelling with his girlfriend and her parents!!!!

Leg spinner Nick Maguire replaced him but was required by our 2A team 90 minutes before we started. With little time available we called in a lower order batsman, when we really needed another quality spinner. Aware we would be playing on a placid pitch I had to decide what sort of total to set whilst fully aware the weather was dodgy with it forecast to rain in the early afternoon.

Our batting never got going, only a last wicket partnership of 26 between Aaron Reid and number eleven Dayne Gardner who surprised himself by hitting a great 6 carried the team through to 110 all out. This left Riccarton a target of 260 to win off what would eventually be 82 overs, or at the very least draw the game for them to secure a championship victory.

At the start of the second day in an effort to strengthen their team Riccarton made three changes. Despite throwing everything at them and desperately searching for wickets, the darkening overhead weather hovering, we just couldn't pick up wickets regularly. It was hard work for very little reward. The

opening batsman brought in on the second day clearly from a higher grade batted superbly, although the boys were definite we had two great lbw shouts on him before he had reached 50.

The game was drifting away from us, we still had plenty of time yet we all knew if we could secure his wicket it was game on. In desperation after tea Chris Duggan, basically a net bowler was thrown the ball and managed to trap him lbw for 104, occupying just short of three hours at the crease. Through Chris an opportunity had presented itself for us to push on. We looked set for a tight finish, how tight no one knew as both wickets and runs were being chipped away. We had a belief amongst all the boys to push on harder and as Chris Hyde keep saying "This Is Our Time," now we needed to try everything possible to make it reality.

Dayne Gardner, Chris Hyde and Sam Baker our quicker bowlers bowled a number of spells from both ends and despite giving everything and more were largely ineffective as wicket takers. This was a day where the slower bowlers had to stand up. Wayne Derham took two crucial wickets when we were a bit down and spinner Aaron Reid led from the front.

Bowling two spells with the second encompassing the crucial last 90 minutes of the days play when the tension was at its highest the captain bowled superbly finishing with 19-8-36-5. When the ninth wicket fell we still had 7 overs left. We just needed one piece of brilliance. Could we be denied now?

Entering the last hour of play 17 overs were available, if the overs are completed and time is not up you bowl to 6pm. With time close to being up and the last throw of the dice made in regards to bowling changes Sam Baker was given the ball for what would be a two over spell, replacing a lion hearted Dayne Gardner who was out on his feet after 19 wicketless overs.

At this stage I believed Sam was the best bet to capture a wicket, he just had to make the batsman play. To this point Sam had only bowled 10 overs and had yet to capture a wicket. Sam bowls with good pace, I entrusted him to bowl straight and hoped he had the belief that he could capture the final wicket. With the 17 overs completed we started our "extra" 18th over at 5.58pm.

Crowding the bat and with good numbers behind the wicket after the fourth ball the umpire stated stumps would be pulled after this over, we were hoping to snatch another over if possible. With Dave McKenzie in close on the offside talking between deliveries to the batsman Sam ran in for the last ball of the over, last ball of the match and the last ball of the 2009-10 season. One ball would define our season, the difference between failure and success. The ball Sam bowled was a beauty, cutting back sending the stump cart wheeling out of the ground. The impossible had happened. **We were Competition Winners.**

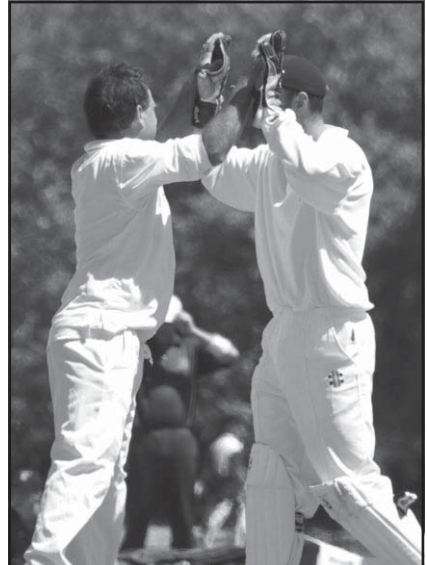

Well we finally lost the monkey off our back and took top spot in this highly contested grade, although made it slightly tougher for ourselves by losing a couple of games late in the season, meaning the last game was a must win.

The team although using the now standard thirty plus players throughout the season generally had a core of 6 or 7 who played every week.

A number of names were thrown around pre-season of potential (or some cases 'definite') recruits, all of whom for a variety of reasons didn't actually eventuate. So it was the usual, albeit a slightly weakened side who fronted up for the first game against the reigning champions, Old Boys Collegians.

In a spirited effort against a quality side we restricted them to 149 and knocked their total off three down.

Starring that day was a player who had shown the odd glimpse of ability in previous season's but nothing like what he was to achieve in what was a truly stellar year. Jeremy Styles was pushed up to open and never looked back, from 83* in the opening fixture against Old Boys he mercilessly punished attacks all over Christchurch finishing the season with 626 runs at 41.73, a remarkable effort, and it was rewarding for all of us to see him succeed in such a manner.

Another main stay of our side was Jeremy's brother Stacey. Stace had another excellent season opening the bowling taking 25 wickets and was often responsible for taking early wickets or putting the brakes on the scoring rate.

Scotty Wilson performed well again making almost 500 runs and taking 21 wickets. He was invaluable to me as he was the guy you threw the ball to when you needed something to happen and he invariably delivered. And with the bat he played some outstanding innings, and was also aggressive and usually vocal in the field.

The skipper and his deputy (Nathan and Ric) didn't have the seasons either of them would have liked with the bat only averaging in the mid 20's, but both played a couple of key innings and Ric contributed mightily in the field taking 19 wickets and 11 catches.

El Hurn was another regular and once again put in a top season averaging 46 with the bat and taking 10 wickets with the ball. A good team man, his innings of 84* against Burnside was one of the best I have seen in this grade, full of shots all around the wicket and in particular his trademark cover drives .



Paul Bennett stood behind the stumps (more and more begrudgingly it seems) and although his keeping was up to his usual high standards his moaning has reached new unscaled heights. His season aggregate of 92 from 10 starts was boosted by a sparkling 46* in a great partnership with Lukey against Sumner.

Trevor Luke had seven digs and much to the chagrin of both himself and PB they totalled exactly the same number of runs for the season – 92, although as Lukey's was in 3 innings fewer he has probably got bragging rights.

Steve Bray had a fine season taking 12 wickets and a low RPO of just over 3. His highlight other than taking a remarkable four catches (unheard of for him) was a majestic spell against our bogey team, Sydenham Cardinals where he took 5-13. He was difficult to replace when not available as you could always count on him to put the pressure on the batsmen.

We picked up the incomparable Brian 'Rangi' Butler around Christmas time and after convincing the skipper he should bowl off-spin from the outset proceeded to take three consecutive bags of three or more wickets, although after firing the skipper first ball based on the shot, not where the ball was pitching or going 'It was a poor shot Jonesy, you don't sweep first ball', was then banned from that particular job for the rest of the season.

John Quinn was again dominant when he was able to play, a spell of 3-1 off 6 overs against our biggest rivals East Shirley Gold was something to behold. He took 9 wickets at 6.11 and scored 195 runs at 65 providing considerable entertainment for those watching.

John Heward is one of the characters in our team and it was a privilege to watch his opening partnership with Jeremy in the game against East Shirley Blue. Chasing a modest 132, we reached their target in no time with Hewie contributing a masterful 54*. A pulled muscle while playing a forward defensive shot (yes only Hewie could achieve that) meant a premature end to his season.

Scott MacAulay, Ross Unwin Steve Lynskey and Scott Aitken played a handful of games each and contributed at some stage, none more than Scott Aitken's gutsy 34 opening the batting against St Albans, Ross's 3-35 in the same game, Scott MacAulay's attacking knock of 24 against Sydenham and Steve's crucial

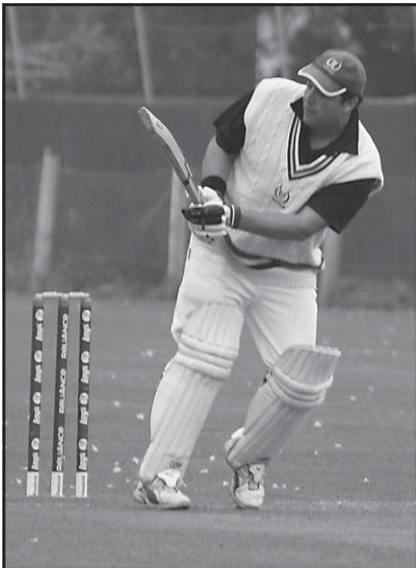

Kyle is a player who possesses the natural power to hit some big sixes, and he is working hard on his judgement and selection of the correct ball to hit, which is paying off in the nets.

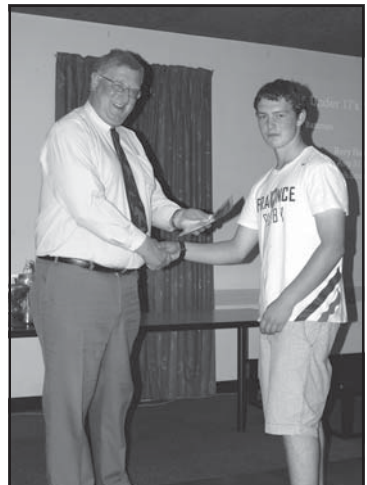

I was thrilled and honoured when asked to captain the Premier Women's team for the 2009/10 season. At my young age I believed that this honour if it were to happen at all would be many years away.

LPW/LPCC had been captained by some real world class legends with Debbie Hockley and Hadiee Tiffen being two of the best. Over time I am determined to leave a positive mark in LPW history as we set about rebuilding not only the Premier team but also the women's section.

After some retirements and departures from the team we had a rather 'new look' squad. This season we had a number of new players and also welcomed back some old faces. Lisa Moore returned from her one year break at St Albans, Lisa recorded her first Premier fifty and also had a promising year behind the stumps.

Sam Fitzsimons came over from St Albans and did a fantastic job opening the batting where she scored a couple of great hundreds and really grew as a player as the season progressed. Sam also took some vital wickets with her swing bowling.

Kelsie Harris returned from a rather long break only to injure herself and miss some more time but when she finally returned Kelsie managed the difficult feat of taking five wickets in a twenty/20 match where against St Albans she recorded 5-14.

Other new players included Rachel Clemens, Micaela Bennet and Zoe Pullar who all became regulars and contributed enormously to the team environment.

Unfortunately from a team perspective the season didn't go so well for us. We were often comprehensively outplayed and only when we had some fantastic standout individual performances did we become really competitive. There is a truckload of talent within the team and we now need to work hard to really improve so we can come back from a season of disappointing results.

Serious and smaller injuries at bad times didn't help us either. At times there were four or five players unavailable due to injury and/or illness. It would be great to be in a position that this wouldn't have had such a huge impact but due to the fact that we were rebuilding our resources were stretched.

In the Show Weekend Twenty/20 tournament we were far from our best and



certainly under-achieved. In three games the individual top score was 45 with the next best 31 and our two leading wicket takers only had four wickets each, which was highly disappointing.

We did learn a lot from the experience and it was fantastic to have the likes of Debbie Hockley play for us again during this weekend and I know the girls learnt a lot from having someone like Debbie around.

In the one-day competition we under performed. We were often given a good platform by the top order. Our openers Sam Fitzsimons 458 runs at 50.89 with a high score of 105 and Frances Mackay 291 runs at 72.75 with a high score of 103 more often than not got the team away to good positive starts. Maria Fahey was often in dashing form scoring 288 runs at 41.14 and a high score of 111.

Too often we failed to capitalize on these starts or we just bowled poorly which was really disappointing with some decent totals easily chased down.

The improvement in Lisa Moore's batting and behind the stumps when wicket keeping was great to see.

Hayley Aburn made giant strides and reaped some good performances and was rewarded with the Lyn Splinter Cup – Best Attitude Premiers at the clubs awards night. Hayley is a promising hard hitting batsman to watch out for.

It was good to see four hundreds scored compared to the previous season where no female reached the three figure mark. Sam Fitzsimons recorded her first Premier Women's hundred and then went on to make another while Frances Mackay also recorded her first LPW club hundred.

We only achieved five one-day fifty's which was slightly disappointing. We also struggled to bowl teams out. Frances Mackay was the leading wicket taker in one-day cricket with 9 and only 18 dismissals over all competitions. We struggled to contain batsmen with our runs per over concession to high.

Everyone performed well at times but the worrying aspect was not being able to apply the pressure and keep the foot on the throat, with it disappointing in constantly giving away easy runs.

In the season ending Twenty/20 competition we performed well and it was a reasonably pleasing end to the season.

The biggest improvement was in our fielding which was pleasing to see as we had worked

hard on it all season. In this competition we scored four fifty's, all from the bat of Frances Mackay who came back from a disappointing injury and was trying extremely hard to make up for lost time.

Frances scored 337 runs averaging 67.4 with a highest score of 88. The next best was Sam Fitzsimons who passed the one hundred run aggregate at an average of 16.83. The wickets were shared around, Emma Besley made a real impact leading the way with 8 scalps. Kelsie Harris claimed 6 (including a fantastic 5-14) and Frances Mackay and Lisa Moore (normally our wicket keeper) had 5 each.

We didn't win a title however we made some good progress and gave new players the opportunity to play and succeed at premier level. Sam Fitzsimons flourished and scored two fantastic hundreds, people took on new leadership roles, Hayley Aburn got opportunities at the top of the order where she took them with both hands, Hana Mauafu and Chloe Armitage both came up from 1st grade and bowled exceptionally well, often against international players and many others got the chance to step up.

Thank you to the dedicated coaches of all the ladies teams. This year the Premiers had our overseas player Gerrie Snyman coaching us. He introduced some new fielding drills and concepts and provided some good insight and technical nous throughout the season. The news we are to have Garry MacDonald next season is brilliant and we are all looking forward to it.

Coaches Kevin McGowan and Maria Fahey did fantastic jobs with their teams and the time and effort they put in definitely showed in some good results and the improvement in the players was visible for all to see. I thank the coaches of both 1st and 3rd grade teams for the co-operation in regards to providing players to Premiers when it was needed.

I also wish to thank everyone who did play for us, whether you were a regular, coming up from the teams below, a work colleague or a friend filling in, or someone being called up out of retirement. It meant a lot to myself and the team that you were prepared to do this so thank you and we hope to see you next season!

This team was initially classed as a development unit, as three had never played the game before & several others had had very limited experience. They worked very hard at practices, came together exceptionally well as a team & because of these factors, had success which was beyond our expectations.

Following the simple basics of the game they were able to exert pressure on opposition teams who had far more experience than us. As an example, opposition teams bowled 200 wides to us. We bowled an average of five per game. (Frequently I was asked by opposition players what we did at training, that caused us to bowl so straight.) We tended to field first where we could & because the girls bowled so straight & had the fielding to back up the bowlers, we seldom chased scores in excess of 60.

Everyone who bowled maintained the lines/lengths required, including those players with the least experience. (The most stunning example of this was Laura Wadley who had figures of 5/5 from 5 overs v Saints who we bowled out for 18.)

Our batters although never under any real pressure, were all determined not to sacrifice their wickets. (During the season we lost only 49 compared to the opposition's 82). Added to this was some excellent fielding which featured 37 catches & several runouts.

The above brief figures would suggest that this team did well in the competition & such was the case. We were first equal in the limited overs comp. & first in the T20 comp. (one puzzling feature at the CCA awards evening however, saw one of the other teams which tied with us, receiving the trophy for the limited overs comp. Puzzling because the competition format as per the handbook, stated that the winner would be that team which finished with the highest number of points. The logic which saw them being declared winners of the trophy defies understanding.)

Several of the girls were selected for Christchurch U15/U17 honours as well, capping off a most successful season for them.

It is likely that some of the team will be required to play 1st grade next season & I have no doubt they will meet with success at that level. They have been a pleasure to coach & I have taken much enjoyment from watching their constant improvement.
